DID YOU KNOW?

The Bill Emerson Good Samaritan Act passed into law by Congress in 1997 states that

donors are protected from both civil and criminal liability when donating food in good faith to a non-profit organization

even if the donated food later causes harm to a recipient. This law was created to encourage the donation of food and grocery products.
